

Burnside Street Names and their Origins

L

<i>Lambden Lane</i>	<i>Hazelwood Park</i>
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Origin of present name

Named after Joseph Lambden.

Joseph and his son ran a cooperage from about 1890 to 1946 on Glynburn Road (on the site of the present Council Depot).

Mrs S.J. Lambden ran the adjacent local shop.

<i>L'Estrange Street</i>	<i>Glenside, Glenunga</i>
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Origin of present name

Unknown.

Said to have been named after a surveyor. Possibly one of the team which subdivided the section.

<i>Lanark Street</i>	<i>Rossllyn Park</i>
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Origin of present name

Unknown.

- Possibly associated with two Scots, Alexander McGeorge a draper and David Tweedy a land agent, who were members of the syndicate that bought the land from T.F. Hyland in 1877 and subdivided in 1878. Both Ayr and Lanark Streets which are named after Scottish towns could have some connection with them. Other syndicate members were James Gartrell (of *Fernilee Lodge*) merchant, Thomas Gordon accountant and William Taylor draper, hence the nearby Gordon Terrace and Taylor Terrace.

The land in this section had previously been a paddock belonging to Dr Penfold.

- An alternative suggested origin is based on the strong Scottish character brought to this locality by the founders of Magill, Robert Cock and William Ferguson, two Scots who met on board the *Buffalo*.

Lanark is on the River Clyde in Scotland.

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Lancelot Avenue

Hazelwood Park

Origin of present name

Unknown.

- Possibly named after Sir John Lancelot Stirling MLC whose wife Florence was the daughter of Sir William Milne of *Sunnyside* in Beaumont. Sir John Stirling was a member of the board of the SA Company who owned the Linden Park section (west of Devereux Road) and the Tusmore section (after whom Stirling Street in Tusmore is named) so it is somewhat uncertain why he may have been remembered by a street that was not on his land. However the land did belong to Sir Alexander Hay of *Linden* a close neighbour of the Milnes and no doubt socially familiar with each other so this could provide a connection.
- Or possibly named after George Lancelot Reed, Secretary of the Police Department and son of George Reed of Heathpool.

La Perouse Avenue

Magill

Earlier name(s) if different from present name

Cowan Street.

Origin of earlier name

Probably named after the local family of David Cowan.

Another former name is believed to have been Merveille which was named after Chateau de Merveille being the name of a winery on the western side of Penfold Road owned by Archibald Chinnery.

Origin of present name

Named after the ten acre property *La Pérouse* on the north east corner of the junction of The Parade and Penfold Road. Leon E. Mazure, (1861 - 1939) vigneron had a winery and champagne cellars here. When the business was sold in 1920 Australian Sparkling Wines Ltd was formed in 1922 with the trading name Romalo. The road passes through the property.

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<i>Lascelles Avenue</i>	<i>Beaumont</i>
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Origin of present name

Unknown.

Probably named after Henry, Viscount Lascelles (1882-1947) 6th Earl of Harewood, who married Princess Mary, who was Princess Royal and only daughter of George V of England. The road was established in about 1922, during the reign of George V, when the area was subdivided by the Thirkell brothers. They then offered allotments for sale in 1924.

Named after Mrs Charles Sydney Leader who owned land where this street now stands.

<i>Lebanon Avenue</i>	<i>Glenunga</i>
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Origin of present name

Probably named after the tree *Cedar of Lebanon*. There are a number of streets in the vicinity lined with cedar trees.

The adjacent street also bears the name of an Australian tree *Taminga*.

Unknown.

Possibly named after the English town of Leighton Buzzard or any of three other villages of this name in Great Britain.

Presumably the *Lentara* property previously extended to this location. The house has more recently been used as an orphanage and is now a retirement home.

Origin of present name

Named after Leonora Krantz.

Leonora was the only child of Hirsch and Rosa Krantz who were the second owners of *Albyn House* which was a large grand house built nearby in 1885 for William Taylor on an estate of 15 acres. Hirsch Krantz, a Russian Jew from Odessa, bought the house in 1900. He was a successful business man, eventually became a millionaire from dealings in real estate and the Leonora Gold Mine in WA which was named after his daughter Leonora.

The estate was subdivided in 1927 and the house now remains as a private nursing home.

The nearby Roslind Street commemorates the name of Hirsch Krantz's wife.

The name is a corruption of the French *le roi* for 'the king'.

<i>Lerwick Avenue</i>	<i>Hazelwood Park</i>
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Origin of present name

Unknown.

Probably named after the village of Lerwick in the Shetland Isles in Scotland. The road is on part of the original *Linden* estate, of which Peter Wood became the second owner in 1900. His parents Gilbert and Anne Wood came from Lerwick in the early 1850s. The estate was first subdivided in 1922, the year after the death of Peter Wood (senior) in 1921, and finally in 1967.

Other streets in the vicinity with names associated with Scotland are Doonoon Avenue, Rothesay Avenue, Seaforth Avenue and Strathspey Avenue.

<i>Leslie Street</i>	<i>Glen Osmond</i>
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Origin of present name

Named after Leslie Chapman.

Chapman was a Government Surveyor related to Robert Chapman who developed the area.

<i>Lewis Avenue</i>	<i>Glen Osmond</i>
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Origin of present name

Named after the Hon John Lewis CMG, MLC (1847 - 1923).

Lewis was a prominent pastoralist and partner in the auctioneering and station agency Bagot, Shakes and Lewis. He was owner of the 16 acre estate and house *Benacre* (which still stands adjacent to Lewis Avenue) between 1913 and 1923. After his death the deer park was subdivided into 39 allotments and the house with seven acres passed to John Lewis' son Lance.

<i>Lincoln Street</i>	<i>Kensington Gardens</i>
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Origin of present name

Unknown.

Possibly named after the town Lincoln in England.

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<i>Linden Avenue</i>	<i>Beaumont, Hazelwood Park</i>
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Origin of present name

Named after the house and estate *Linden*.

Linden was established by Sir Alexander Hay in 1861 on Section 297 through which Linden Avenue passes. From 1900 it was the property of Peter Wood and then his son Peter, until finally demolished in 1967.

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Origin of present name

Named after Rev W. Lockhart Morton.

Morton ran a missionary training home in the house *Seaton* (probably 1900 to 1914) which can be found on the nearby Toowong Avenue. The house was originally built in 1875 by Gilbert Wood before he moved to *Linden* in 1900. Adjacent land was subdivided in 1920 and the house has now been converted into flats.

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<i>Lockwood Road</i>	<i>Erindale, Burnside</i>
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Earlier name(s) if different from present name

Jarvis Street. Elizabeth Street.

Origin of earlier name

See Jarvis Street, Erindale.

Origin of present name

Named after Joseph Lockwood (1825 - 1896).

Lockwood was a baker and general store owner in the village of Burnside. He bought the land to the north east of High Street and Lockwood Road in 1852 and built the shop Lockwood's Store on the corner. He remained in business until 1874 when he moved to a farm on the Yorke Peninsula.

The shop still stands, though heavily modified.

<i>Loma Linda Grove</i>	<i>Wattle Park</i>
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Origin of present name

Unknown.

May have Spanish connections or a connection with the hospital of that name in America.

<i>Lomond Avenue</i>	<i>Kensington Park</i>
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Origin of present name

Unknown.

Possibly named after *Loch Lomond* in Scotland, or after the ship *Loch Lomond* which made seven voyages to Adelaide between 1894 and 1900.

Other streets in Kensington Park with ships' names are Birnie, Jessie, May and Alpha.

<i>Lossie Street</i>	<i>Kensington Park</i>
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Origin of present name

Unknown.

Possibly named after the town of Lossiemouth, and the adjacent Lossie Forest near Inverness in Scotland.

The adjacent streets Birnie and Lomond also have Scottish names but they may refer to ships' names.

Unknown.

Probably a family name.

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Earlier name(s) if different from present name

None.

Origin of earlier name

When the suburb was laid out this was an unnamed pathway. The Burnside Council later decided that the paths should have names so that they could be more easily identified.

Origin of present name

Named after the ship *Lysander*.

The *Lysander* was the ship that transported the Fergusson family from Scotland to South Australia. The family occupied Monreith Farm (now Toorak Gardens) for many years.
