

<i>Yeltana Avenue</i>	<i>Wattle Park</i>
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**Origin of present name**

Unknown.

Probably based on the Aboriginal word *yeltanna* meaning ‘cool’ or a ‘cool place’, but note the different spelling.

**Year in which street acquired present name**

<i>Yeronga Avenue</i>	<i>Kensington Park</i>
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**Earlier name(s) if different from present name**

Wandilla Avenue.

**Origin of earlier name**

A four-roomed cottage at 56 Yeronga Avenue was extended between 1868 and 1915 into a much larger house which was called *Wandilla*. It was the residence of Edmund Bowman once of Martindale Hall but more lately of the *Wandilla* estate nearby. It later became the home of R. V. Jordan the land agent.

**Origin of present name**

Unknown.

Probably from the Aboriginal word *yerong* a place for an Aboriginal initiation ceremony. Shipster’s Paddock which was on the other side of The Parade was the location of Aboriginal corroborees with gatherings of three or four hundred in the early days of European settlement.

Other streets in the vicinity with names associated with Aboriginal words are Corinda Avenue and Toowong Avenue.

<i>Young Street</i>	<i>Beulah Park</i>
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**Origin of present name**

Possibly named after the Governor Sir Henry Fox Young.

Named when John Amery subdivided the southern part of Section 288 into 105 allotments in 1851.

Carlisle Street (now changed to Duke Street) and Salop Street were created at the same time.

Named after James Milne Young (1844-1916).

James Young married Eliza the daughter of John Symons who had a market garden in Young Street.
