The February Meeting, Helen Bills report edited.

Anne and Ross Both are life members of BHS. They gave a well-researched presentation on the life of Osmond Gilles and the grave restoration project. Anne Both spoke first about the background of Osmond Gilles. Born in London in 1788 he became wealthy during his time in Hamburg. Prior to migrating to South Australia on HMS Buffalo in 1836, he worked with Wakefield, Gouger and Kingston to set up the colony. As Colonial Treasurer he collected revenue and was responsible for titles. A successful businessman; he took up land throughout the colony and was a generous philanthropist heavily committed to community involvement.

He was involved in mining, exploration, surveying Eyre Peninsula and pastoral pursuits especially with merino sheep. He promoted the railway connection to Port Adelaide, was on the naming committee for the streets of Adelaide, the parklands committee and sat in the Supreme Court.

His wife died young and there were no children. Today there are few physical reminders of this remarkable man. His home *Woodley House* is still standing at Glen Osmond. OG Road, Gilleston in Balhannah, Lake Gilles Conservation Park, Gilles Arcade and the suburb of Glen Osmond are named after him. Now his fully restored grave is a fitting memorial.

Facebook

As the City of Burnside is noted for its tree cover, we should support other councils attempting to save theirs. The Evolution of our Constitution and the Implications.



At the August meeting in 2020, members passed amendments to our Constitution. As we are an Incorporated society, the amended Constitution has to be approved by the South Australian Consumer and Business Services (CBS) Registration unit of the Attorney– Generals Department.

The Associations Incorporation Act 1985 was updated in July 2020. There are now strict rules governing Incorporated Associations such as BHS. There is a concern that some societies are being used by individual members for their personal benefit and not for the organisation.

The emphasis of the rules is on accountability of Incorporated organisations. Within this accountability, members and individuals must not profit from the activities of the society. All decisions regarding BHS activities should also be approved beforehand by the committee. All outgoing correspondence should only be signed by an approved member. There has to be correct and appropriately signed minutes of meetings and a proper standard of accounting and financial reporting. There are serious penalties under the Act for anyone who does not adhere to the legislation.

We need to follow these rules. In this digital age we can be monitored at the push of a button. Deviating from these rules could be quickly picked up by the authorities.

This amended Constitution was submitted in September last year. Since then the CBS registration unit has requested a number of changes and additions to meet their accountability rules. This process is still on-going.



Once our Constitution is approved and registered by CBS, then we will present it to you at a General meeting for your ratification. Meanwhile, we thank Margaret Ford for the many hours she is putting into negotiations for approval of the Constitution.

Burnside Historical Society Committee News

We have held two meetings this year in committee members' houses. This has been much better. The History room of the library, being a public space, meant we often had interruptions. Now the library space is limited to 4 people. We also tried a local café but it was very noisy.

The meetings focus on the **Core** business of BHS. This covers Finances, Correspondence, Monthly meetings, Membership and Publicity and specific management issues such as sub-committees.

At the January meeting we decided to discontinue using Eventbrite for meetings. We are now allowed 90 people at meetings. It is still important that members book for each meeting by email or phone.

The programme sub-committee has completed planning the meetings for the year. They welcome ideas for speakers and topics for 2022.

We decided the Bulletin would be sent out approximately every two months. It will include reports on meetings, BHS news and any appropriate news from other organisations.

The BHS Website is being managed by Elaine Smyth and John Thomas. They have updated their knowledge of the latest Website programmes. They are now working on updating the website.

We also discussed the management of Facebook. The rules of the Associations Incorporation Act 1985 updated in July 2020, mean any public documentation under BHS must be approved by the committee. Thus posting have to be approved before being made.

The Annual Journal sub-committee presented their excellent and comprehensive report. We are aiming to get this published by November.

We also discussed the BHS brochures. Some slight updating of the wording will be needed. Despite last years Covid-19 restrictions, most of the brochures were taken. We will re-order another batch this year. Other publicity includes advertising the meetings in the "Adelaide East Herald" and the B...Connected section in the Winter (June) edition of the Burnside Council's FOCUS newsletter.

News from the Annual Journal sub-Committee

In December the first meeting was held with Bob Stace, Liz Silz, Anne Both and Helen Bills. Reasons were discussed for the new journal. In 2020 the committee responsible for the Quarterly newsletter resigned after many years of service. (Ed: The Burnside Council criteria for grants also changed . On-going Newsletter funding was no longer available.)

The managing Committee decided to produce an annual “journal” instead of a quarterly newsletter, maintaining a regular Bulletin for communication. After discussion the sub-committee recommended the annual publication be titled the: **“Annual Journal of the Burnside Historical Society”**

It was agreed that the Journal’s purpose was “to document the year that was for BHS with an emphasis on Burnside matters”

The suggested content of the Annual Journal could include: President’s annual report (with photo); List/photo of BHS Committee; Key activities of the year; List of all events and photos conducted by BHS for the year; Reports of activities, speakers and outings with photos); Historical articles and photos on Burnside; Award for best annual research article and Interviews with members/local residents on historical and heritage matters. The 2021 edition could also feature something from 1981. All this information to be compiled during the year in a standard format such as Word, for easier editing.

An editorial committee would need to be established ASAP to produce the Journal. Each member of this committee would be responsible for coordinating/producing particular content. Volunteers to be recruited to support the editorial committee.

Further issues to be discussed in the March sub-committee meeting include size, computer programme used, monochrome and/or colour, cover design, printing and assembling, distribution, when published (November favoured) and sources of funding and publicity.

Some major recommendations were made. These being for BHS to proceed with an annual publication documenting the year that was in the life of the Society. This publication to be entitled “The Annual Journal of the Burnside Historical Society” The first Journal be published in November 2021 and email distribution be encouraged to minimise costs. (Some members may wish to receive a hard copy).

Tusmore Park Wading Pool Proposed Upgrade.



At the Burnside Council Meeting held on the 28th January 2021 three residents spoke about the Tusmore park pool proposal. Meredith Ide speaking on behalf of BHS, made an heartfelt plea for the council to consider the heritage aspects of this pool. Here are parts of her speech to the Council and the outcome.

“As a young mother I remember Tusmore Park wading pool being popular as a safe, well-loved, leafy sanctuary with parents, children, especially toddlers. Grandparents appreciated its ambience. It has been a unique, free facility shared with residents and others outside this City. Families have memories of relaxing times and summertime picnics.

Nevertheless, as stated it is the report, the pool has many ailments and does not meet current legislative standards and now, one might say, public expectations. It needs to be upgraded.....The wading pool, opened February 1966, is identified on the Local Heritage Register as Location listed as Tusmore, the item Titled - Children’s Wading Pool.....‘as it displays historical, economic or social themes that are of importance to the local area’.....We should value this Tusmore location, part of this City’s Heritage. It is listed for a reason.....I suggest that an interpretive panel be erected adjacent to the pool displaying the history, original basic features with images to educate residents, ratepayers and the visiting public to understand the true value of this nearly 55 year old facility”.

Meredith was successful in raising the councils awareness of the heritage aspects of the site. The council endorsed the concept design Option 2 but they also requested further reports. These to detail options on the proposed fencing (the above photo shows the original fencing) and to recognise the heritage aspects of the site.

Well done and thankyou Meredith for making the council aware of the heritage value of the pool and fencing.

Restoration of Old St David's Anglican Church

Warren Harch, Peoples Warden of the Anglican Parish of Burnside, contacted me regarding their restoration project. They have a 10 year plan to restore the old church (now the Parish Hall), the Parish offices, the current Modernist church, the streetscape in front of the old church and landscaping of the area. In planning this restoration they have involved Burnside Council, Heritage SA staff and a Heritage Conservation Architect.

Burnside Council was proclaimed in 1856 and in 1869 the Council Chambers were built. In 1887 St David's church was dedicated, one of the earliest churches in Burnside. The Council Chambers are now the Parish Offices. As such these former council chambers and the adjoining hall form an important part of the history of Burnside.

They have applied for a SA Heritage Grant and on behalf of BHS, I wrote a letter supporting their application. We wish them every success.

Moorcroft Reserve

In June 2020 on behalf of the BHS Committee, I wrote to Chris Cowley, CEO of the City of Burnside. It concerned the destruction of the of the significant sluice gate abutments in the reserve. A subsequent inspection of area by BHS committee members also revealed the deterioration of the 1889 Carriage Bridge. This built as part of the Erindale house estate. Burnside Council were advised of this and a comprehensive report was developed by Dash architects. They made a number of recommendation for the reserve and carriage bridge. Since then Colin Harris has been following this up with the council. Colin advised us by email that Burnside Council have engaged a consulting engineer to prepare a report on repair and restoration of the bridge. This is due in March. We will keep you informed.

Rose Park Fallen Soldiers Memorial

Michelle Toft advised that the City of Burnside is applying for a grant through the Department of Veteran Affairs. The proposal has three components. First to ensure all First World War fallen soldiers have a tree memorial plaque. Secondly to seek community consultation on interpretation for the whole memorial. Thirdly, to have an information on the memorial available for the public. Michelle will let us know the outcome of the application.

A Blog on the “History Corner”

Michelle Toft has set up a blog called the ‘History Corner’ on the City of Burnside website. It is where local history volunteers and the Historical and Cultural Officer can share some of their research findings including stories of the pubs in Burnside, historic figures and crime mysteries.

Discover Mortlock Treasures

Two weeks after the passing of the South Australia Act on August 14th 1834, Richard Hanson and Robert Gouger formed the South Australian Literary Association. Members donated books and about 40 have survived as the Gouger Collection. The collection grew but the library could not survive on subscriptions alone. In 1856 a bill was passed to establish the South Australian Institute and a building was built in 1861. By 1874 the collection of books and museum pieces had outgrown the accommodation. The then Public Library, Museum and Art Gallery board began the process of building further accommodation. The Mortlock Chamber was built in 1884 as a public library, museum and art gallery. By the time it was completed the South Australian Institute had become a separate organisation. The new building was known as the Public Library.

Bring children or grandchildren (or even yourself) and see if you can find these treasures in the Mortlock Chamber: Adelaide on the globe; Stuffed birds; Sailing ships; Hand drawn maps; Old books; Phonograph canisters; Spinning tops; Games to play; Sporting badges; Wooden cross beams, Sliding ladders and Arches.

Carley Shevlin of L'Estrange Street

A few days ago Michelle Toft received an enquiry from Alison Bortell. Michelle has organised for this story to be shared through the City of Burnside social media, but would also like it shared with BHS members. Alison from the United Kingdom, is asking for help to find relatives of her mother's wartime pen pal.

Carley Shevlin of L'Estrange Street, Glenside wrote letters to her London pen pal (Jean Bennet ne Reid) between 1944-49 about life in Australia during World War II. The ten letters describe home life, family, work, droughts and food shortages. Alison would like the letters to be given to Carley's family. So if you know Carley or a relative, please get in touch.

Alison botterill writes:

"I've just posted off a package with all of the letters from Carley Shevlin. I've let Michelle know that I'd be sending them to you in the first instance. She mentioned that they would be scanned so I would be happy have copies too in due course. I am currently typing up my mother's replies to Carley - some are already typed, and others she clearly just scribbled down on scraps of paper as a record of what she had written to Carley. Would these be of interest too? I could send scans when I've transcribed them all.

For information, my mother was Jean Reid (who became Jean Bennett when she married my father in 1952) and she was born in Wandsworth, south-west London in 1928 and died in Hertfordshire in 2000. She was one of 6 children (all real redheads!) and was born into a free-thinking family, her mother having come to London from Scotland, and becoming involved in women's suffrage before joining the WAAC during WW1. My grandmother was very much ahead of her time and I'm very sad that she died in 1949 so I never got a chance to talk to her. My mother's father was also Scottish but her parents met in London. I'm attaching a photo of her, which I believe may have been taken around the time she was writing to Carley".
